


10 THEOLOGICAL MISCONCEPTIONS CHECKLIST

1	God’s fundamental posture toward us is hatred.	We feel stuck in our shame, sin, and unworthiness, struggling to believe that God delights in us.	Scripture begins with our identity as made in God’s image: We are fearfully and wonderfully made, created with purpose and beloved from the start.	Genesis 2:7-15; Psalm 139:13-16
2	Some people are more broken and beyond redemption than others.	We divide the world into “us” and “them,” justifying contempt for others while assuming we are somehow more worthy of God’s love than they are.	We are all both beloved and broken, victims and perpetrators. Compassion grows when we approach others with curiosity, as image bearers shaped by complex stories.	Genesis 3:8-13; Psalm 51:14
3	We are incapable of pleasing God.	We may feel distant and wary of God, inclined toward passivity in living our faith.	God invites people to be active participants in his redemptive story. Our agency matters in God’s Kingdom.	Genesis 18:16-19; Hebrews 2:10-18
4	God has to punish sin before he can love us.	We see God as reluctant to love us or believe he loves us only because Jesus intervenes.	God describes himself as compassionate, slow to anger, and full of forgiveness.	Exodus 34:5-7
5	God is for some kinds of people and against other kinds of people.	We become hostile to our enemies, assuming they are beyond God’s grace.	God is for the flourishing of even those we fear or despise. He offers mercy to everyone.	Jonah 3:8-10; 4:2


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Faith is just about going to heaven when you die.
