Tyndale House Publishers was founded by Kenneth and Margaret Taylor in 1962 in order to publish Ken’s book *Living Letters*. The book was very successful, but although Ken and Margaret could have used the income it generated, Ken assigned the copyright to a charitable trust so that the royalties could all be used for charitable purposes. The Taylors then established Tyndale House Foundation (THF) in 1963 to receive and distribute the royalties. This was the fulfillment of a goal Ken Taylor had first expressed a decade earlier—to establish a charitable fund that could make grants to support Christian work around the world.

Over the next twenty-five years, Ken donated the copyrights to all the “Living” books and then *The Living Bible* (published in 1971) to THF. When the *Holy Bible*, New Living Translation was published in 1996, its copyright was also assigned to Tyndale House Foundation.

Over the years, the Foundation has made many thousands of grants to support Christian work across a wide variety of categories. Traditionally, the Foundation’s primary focus has been Christian literature work, including Bible translation in new languages around the world. But it also makes grants in areas as diverse as evangelism, disaster relief, leadership development, and local projects.



A Brief History of the Foundation

Early grants included major gifts to the Association of Evangelicals of Africa for establishment of new seminaries in Anglophone and Francophone Africa. Those schools—Africa International University and the Faculté de Theologie Evangelique de Bangui (FATEB)—are still thriving today.

The Foundation also provided seed funding for a handful of other Christian charities, including Focus on the Family, Cabrini Green Legal Aid clinic, and Seed Company (originally a subsidiary of Wycliffe Bible Translators).

Mark Taylor served as Executive Director of THF from 1973 to 1979, when Mary Kleine Yehling succeeded him in that role. Mark subsequently served

as President of THF in addition to his role as CEO of Tyndale House Publishers. Jeremy Taylor joined the Board of Directors of THF in 2005, succeeding his grandfather, Ken Taylor. Jeremy became President of THF in 2018.

In 2001, Ken and Margaret Taylor transferred ownership of Tyndale House Publishers to the Foundation. As a result, the dividends from the profitable operations of the publishing company began to flow to the Foundation. This enabled THF to increase its annual grant budget to \$5 million while also beginning to set aside funds as a permanent endowment for THF. The THF Board established a policy of making payouts from the endowment equal to 5% of the 60-month average asset value. This adds to the grantmaking budget while also providing a cushion to ensure that THF can continue making grants into the future. As of May 2024 the endowment stands at \$30 million.

Since 1963, adjusting for inflation, THF has given away nearly \$300 million in today’s dollars. We praise God for his faithfulness in allowing Tyndale House Foundation to be used for such tremendous global impact over its first sixty years of ministry, and we pray he will continue to use this organization for many years to come.

Because Tyndale is a publishing enterprise, the Foundation places a special emphasis on international Christian publishing. We seek to partner with organizations working to meet the spiritual needs of people through the publication of literature consistent with biblical principles. Through the Foundation, we accomplish this through four priorities:

Indigenous Publisher Support. Supporting indigenous publishers to help create sustainable and flourishing Christian publishing industries. This includes supporting publishing networks, book and magazine publishers, printing support, and modernization of methods.

Resource Development. Supporting the development of contextualized and relevant books and curriculums that will serve to edify the local church in areas where resources are few.

Bible Translation. Making Scripture accessible and understandable for all people everywhere in their heart language.

Distribution. Partnering with organizations utilizing innovative approaches to distribute literature and serve local populations with biblical resources.



Kupenda for the Children

Establishing a Disability Guidebook

Just months after her birth, Yaakim began to show signs of significant health issues. Her family had no idea why she was doing so poorly, and they were scared for her life. Her head was enlarged, she constantly cried, she wouldn't eat, she appeared malnourished, she wasn't getting enough sleep, and she had difficulty breathing. Yaakim's father, Simon, is a pastor in the community. He prayed that God would heal his daughter, but she only got worse. Yaakim's parents were desperate for God to answer their prayers and were heartbroken as they watched their daughter get worse. Many people in their community believed having a child like Yaakim meant the family had done something wrong and was being punished.

Simon thought that another pastor's prayers might be more effective than his. So Yaakim's parents took her to Pastor Mlanda, with the hope that his healing prayers would work. They did not know that this pastor had recently attended Kupenda's Disability Advocacy Workshop and had received a copy of our Disability Guidebook.

When Pastor Mlanda met Yaakim, he immediately recognized her condition as hydrocephalus because he had seen a picture of a child like her at the workshop and in his copy of the Disability Guidebook. He shared with the family what he had learned about the condition, including that it was caused by fluid buildup near her brain and that there were treatments that

could help. Pastor Mlanda then connected the family to Kupenda's Kenyan field office, where they could access more support.

Kupenda's Project Officer was able to expand on some of what Pastor Mlanda had shared about Yaakim's condition and made arrangements for the family to get support at a hospital in Kijabe that specialized in cases like Yaakim's. Pastor Mlanda accompanied the family on a public bus to this hospital, which is 400 miles away from their home.

After performing tests and scans, the hospital staff were able to diagnose Yaakim with a congenital malformation, malnutrition, hydrocephalus, and pneumonia. Once she was given medications and other necessary treatments, her condition improved significantly. She was discharged from the hospital with plans to pursue further treatment with a medical geneticist. Surgery to correct her hydrocephalus was scheduled.


Yaakim's family is incredibly relieved to see their daughter continue to grow and improve and to know that her condition wasn't caused by anything they did wrong.

Yaakim is now better understood by her family, thanks to the counseling they received from Kupenda's staff and Pastor Mlanda. Her condition continues to improve, and she is growing healthier each day.

But what if Kupenda didn't exist? What if Pastor Mlanda hadn't attended Kupenda's workshop or received a Disability Guidebook so he could help Yaakim's family?

Kupenda's Kenyan staff member said, "If Pastor Mlanda had not referred her, we might not have this child with us today."

This year, in addition to Pastor Mlanda, Kupenda trained hundreds of other community leaders as disability advocates. These influential pastors, traditional healers, government officials, and community health workers are now providing invaluable services to thousands of children in their communities. Every day they are not only improving but also saving the lives of children like Yaakim.





International Graduate School of Leadership

Center for Theological Inquiry in Asia

The Center for Theological Inquiry in Asia (CTIA) made significant strides in its first year, producing over 21 high-quality short-form projects, including 17 articles of about 1,000 words each and four “deep dives” of 2,000–3,000 words each, with over 10 more projects written and in pre-publication processes. These works address key questions in Asian Christianity, such as how to respond to suffering, how to counteract the prosperity gospel, and how to engage local cultures faithfully. Each piece bridges biblical, evangelical faith with life in Asia, helping Christians think about their faith and share it effectively.



Testimony from a CTIA Junior Fellow and author of the Taglish book project:

“The book’s thirteen chapters are expositions of the articles in the Apostles’ Creed. Evangelical churches in the Philippines need a more robust theological backbone to withstand the onslaught of unbiblical worldviews and ideologies that are spreading in our society. Because of our culture’s fascination with novelties, we also need to rediscover the ancient roots of our Christian faith. We live in a divisive and pluralistic age, and so we need to recover a greater appreciation for the core biblical teachings that unite Christians around the world. And because we lack theological resources that are accessible to ordinary Christians, I am excited to get this book, written in our heart language, into the hands of many Filipino readers. I pray that the Lord will use this resource to help Filipino Christians grow deeper into the gospel we treasure above everything.”

Writing and editing articles that sought to address the daily realities of Asia was a challenging endeavor, but I am thankful for the productive collaboration of our team. These pastors are now intentionally considering how to integrate their indigenous cultures into their church’s discipleship ministries. In the past, we were so accustomed to merely echoing Western theological perspectives. Inner City Impact

Leadership Development



Julien had never even heard of Inner City Impact (ICI) before a friend invited him. Once he started coming, Julien says he got really attached to ICI and just kept coming back. When asked, since that meeting, why he kept coming, he responds, *“You guys were explaining the Bible—and I have a personal interest in that. You leaders aren’t just leaders at ICI; you take interest in us outside of ICI and interact with kids outside of ICI programs.”*

Julien wasn’t always interested in God or the Bible. At first he had very little exposure or experience with Christianity, but God was preparing his heart as he asked questions and sought truth. Julien eventually took a step of faith and surrendered his life to the Lord.

Julien’s mom was not very enthusiastic when he started coming to ICI. She would often remind him that he didn’t really need ICI or that he could always go next week. But as she has seen changes in his life, she now encourages him to go. He thinks she’d probably think something was wrong if he didn’t go.

Julien has experienced many firsts through ICI. The first time he came to church, he was overwhelmed and uncomfortable. However, like with ICI, he kept coming, and now he enjoys the community and the worship, even adding Christian worship songs to his music playlists. Some of his favorite songs are “My Lighthouse,” “Graves into Gardens,” and “Waymaker.” Another first for Julien was camping, one of his favorite ICI memories.

Julien is going through our Leadership Development Program. He doesn’t have a father figure around, so he says that the guy leaders at ICI help show him things a father would and more. He was advised to stick to his word when making plans and to follow through on them. He values this advice and the encouragement to act and be mature. He recognizes the importance of this in a way he might not have if it weren’t for the godly men intentionally stepping into his life. As part of the Leadership Development Program, he helps out at the elementary club, where he realizes, *“what I’m doing at ICI is an everywhere thing.”* Julien was excited to see some younger kids he volunteers with outside ICI. They recognized him at Walmart over the weekend and stopped him to say hi. *“It’s pretty cool,”* he muses. Community is a big part of what ICI is all about.



We seek to partner with organizations working to shape a believer’s understanding, attitude, and behavior toward that of Jesus Christ at each stage of their Christian journey. In this area, we have a special emphasis in evangelistic outreach, leadership development, Scripture engagement, and youth ministry.

Evangelistic Outreach. Taking the gospel to unreached places and people groups through mission work and church planting.

Leadership Development. Cultivating the growth of leaders to become men and women of sincere and unshakable faith who model biblical integrity—and are effective ministers of the gospel.

Scripture Engagement. Interacting with God’s Word in community and learning how to apply it within contemporary realities.

Youth Ministry. Investing in the next generation through mentorship and training, enabling youth to become Christlike leaders who effect change in their homes, churches, and communities.



After 2000 years of waiting for someone else, for some specialist, for some donor, to choose their people and their language, they are now taking matters into their own hands.

“Bad Catholic” Discovers He’s a Pastor

Among the Muslim tribe of Cameroon, Raphael helped three technicians facilitate the production of Scripture passages.

Silas, a self-proclaimed “bad Catholic,” received the 25 Creation to Christ audio Discovery Bible Studies (DBS) in his language. Then he played them for his village chief. The chief loved them and started a DBS of 16 people. The word got out. Soon so many people wanted to attend that they had to hang the audio player in a tree in the village center. During an evening DBS, a cow ran into the tree, sending the audio player crashing to the ground, broken. The people all chipped in and bought a huge audio box much larger than the first. Eventually many from the village chose Jesus and were baptized.

Silas contacted Raphael and said, *“The village needs a pastor. Please send us a pastor.”*

Raphael replied, *“You’ve got to be kidding. You are the pastor.”* *“But I’m a lousy Catholic,”* said Silas.

“You’re the guy who started all this. Just keep leading the DBS,” Raphael replied. Raphael continues the relationship of mentoring Silas as their fellowship matures.

They are done waiting!

In May 2023, we watched two Bible-less teams from the Horn of Africa orally translate, record, and edit their first ever passages from God’s Word. We realized, *“They’re finally done waiting.”* After 2000 years of waiting for someone else, for some specialist, for some donor, to choose their people and their language, they are now taking matters into their own hands. Church-based teams are creating their own accurate, clear, and natural-sounding audio Bible passages.

Awoo, who lives among his people, said, *“I oversee church-planting work among many oral tribes in the southern part of my country, including these two languages. It is so hard to get leaders to commit to the work, because all they can do when they get together is sing a few songs and pray, and then disperse. There is no content from God’s Word that they can share and discuss . . . but now it’s different!”*

Kingdom Impact

In South Asia, our team met with eight men who lead 26 ESP (Ending Scripture Poverty) languages. As of August 2023, 13 of these languages have completed recording their first set of 21 Scripture passages. Through using these new audio “Creation to Christ” story sets of 25 passages from the Bible, these teams have now begun 1,041 new Discovery Bible Studies, of which 566 have become churches of baptized believers. We rejoice in not only the completion of translated story sets but how the translated Bible is also immediately being used by church planters!

Africa Leadership Study

In November 2023, the Tyndale House Foundation board and staff traveled to Nairobi, Kenya, to gather with international partners for a closing ceremony of the Africa Leadership Study (ALS) program. ALS was the Foundation's first program, formally launched in 2010 in an effort to move away from funding Western-led projects in Africa toward locally led work on the continent. The Foundation and its partners sought to support local leaders carrying out faith-based work in their own communities and contexts.

The findings from the Africa Leadership Study revealed many rich insights, including who the rising African leaders were, what they were about, and why they were effective as leaders. In addition, the ALS findings yielded insights into all of the areas of society in which these leaders were serving. The ALS program outcomes included a book about the study and its findings, titled *African Christian Leadership*, as well as a summary booklet titled *17 Findings of the Africa Leadership Study*. Through these and other resources and through speaking engagements and conferences, our learnings have found a global audience as ALS partners have sought to train and equip leaders for a multiplication of effective leadership in Africa.

As part of our celebration, we wanted to know just what kind of impact this program has had throughout its fifteen years. In the months prior to the celebration in November 2023, we partnered with a research firm to conduct an impact evaluation. The findings of this evaluation revealed that the impact of the Africa Leadership Study is extensive and ongoing, but I'd like to highlight three critical areas that have shaped our strategic approach to funding work in the area of leadership development in Africa.

Fortifying the Role of the African Church in Society

The Africa Leadership Study identified the church as a relevant agent of change in society throughout Africa. It challenged the notion that the church is useful solely for Africans' spiritual lives. Rather, the study illustrated the difference Christian leaders make in communities, extending impact beyond the walls of local churches.

Centering African Perspectives on Leadership

The study significantly advanced and clarified the voices of African leaders. By identifying individual leaders and studying their priorities and practices, ALS researchers highlighted and advanced African perspectives about leadership. This has reinforced the value of leadership on the continent from an African viewpoint and with an African voice.

Illuminating New Possibilities for Leadership

The ALS findings underscored the need for intentional and strategic development of local leaders in Africa. As a result, THF has been well positioned to encourage our African partners to engage more in the support, training, and development of local leaders, and we have participated in efforts to mobilize the church to address those needs as well.

The Africa Leadership Study created conditions that inspire and warrant space for new leaders, new initiatives, continental and global platforms for African voices, and many other areas of significance today and in the future. Engagement de l'Afrique Retrospective

In 2015, Tyndale House Foundation embarked on a collaborative project to strengthen theological education in Francophone Africa by working with three schools in Cote d'Ivoire, Democratic Republic of Congo, and Central African Republic. This project was named Engagement de l'Afrique (Engaging Africa). The project focused on five key areas: internet and related infrastructure, library support, a joint academic colloquium and journal, doctoral program development, and the development and sustainability of the schools' mission and purpose. After eight years of walking alongside the three schools and supporting their growth and development, Tyndale House Foundation is pleased that the initial project goals have been accomplished.

Tyndale House Foundation contracted Excellence in Giving's research division, EIG Insights, to conduct a program and impact evaluation on the Engagement de l'Afrique project. The results from the evaluation were overwhelmingly positive and represented each school as feeling that the program was a great success. The areas with the greatest improvement were the library support and the doctoral program development. Another overwhelmingly positive outcome noted from the evaluation was the relationship developed between THF and each of the schools as well as between the three schools themselves. We are grateful for the success of this program and what has been accomplished by each school. We look forward to continuing our relationships with the schools and we are excited to see the progress continue.







Impact Story

Five Talents

Literacy and Economic Empowerment
through Biblical Wisdom

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In terms of individuals, God has used literacy training to enable formerly illiterate men and women to read and reflect on the Bible independently as well as to access and participate in Christian community. In the words of one participant, “Significant changes have come through Bible study and sharing God’s Word in my literacy group.” As a result, participants have been strengthened in their faith, and more people have come to church. For example, in our program in Terekeka, 33 percent of program participants reported attending a place of worship prior to starting the program; now 77 percent of participants report attending church.

In terms of strengthening the institution of the church, Paul Modi, Anglican bishop of Terekeka, reports that high rates of illiteracy such as are found in rural South Sudan affect all sectors of life. In Terekeka, only 7 percent of adult men and women could read and write when Five Talents began conducting literacy training. Bishop Modi says the training has strongly affected the capacity of people to lead churches and outreach ministries. As people gain literacy, they also gain access to their previously unrealized leadership capacities. Notably, in Terekeka, two church leaders have been ordained to the diaconate after learning to read. These graduates are now able to lead church services deep in the rural areas of Terekeka in two parishes that have never before had an ordained church leader.

But church leadership is not the only form of leadership strengthened through the literacy programs. Outreach ministries have been strengthened

as well. For example, Elizabeth is a participant from Juba. Elizabeth is part of Unity Group, which is located in the Rock City portion of Juba town.

Elizabeth is 28 years old. She has a husband and four children. Elizabeth first joined one of the literacy groups two years ago. Prior to joining, she had never been to school and could not read or write. But after meeting with her group for a year, she became literate. Elizabeth says the thing she values most about becoming literate is that “now I know what is going on in the world—before I did not understand. Now my eyes are open. I understand local events and also my rights as a woman and a community member.”

As a result of her participation in the literacy group, Elizabeth has become a lay leader in her local church. She is also a leader in the “Young Families” program of the Episcopal Church of South Sudan (ECSS), which supports young mothers and fathers in leading well in their homes and communities. She told us, “Even though I had been going to church my whole life, I never really understood what was being said—that is, until I could read the Bible for myself. I am proud that I can now read in church, especially for others in the community who are still illiterate.”

Elizabeth has also shared that her participation in her literacy group has really changed her thinking about other people with needs in her community. She is now ready and willing to help others who are like her. She wants “to help the disadvantaged have a better life.” She has seen what women can do and how they can be part of building the future of South Sudan. She says that her dream is “to help other women like me. I don’t want women to be laughed at or put to shame. To be told they have no value. Women are strong. Together we can build a future for South Sudan.”

They read from the Book of the Law of God and clearly explained the meaning of what was being read, helping the people understand each passage. —Nehemiah 8:8 (NLT)

Pastor Training. Ensuring pastors are properly equipped with biblical knowledge and maturity to preach faithfully and shepherd their congregations well.



Heart for Lebanon

Missional Leadership Program


As God's providence would have it, Tulin's neighbors extended an invitation that would forever change the course of her life. They invited her to attend a nearby church, and it was there that she encountered something truly unexpected. Tulin was astonished by the genuine love and unity that she witnessed among the members of the church, who considered each other brothers and sisters. Their unwavering faith in the promise of eternal life in heaven left a profound impact on her.

Filled with excitement and curiosity, Tulin delved into the Bible, her journey spurred on by her husband's shared interest in understanding what the Scriptures revealed. Believers from the church regularly visited their home, conducting Bible studies that enriched their understanding of the Word. It was during a study of the Gospel of John that Tulin and her husband's faith deepened. They were profoundly moved by Jesus' powerful declarations: "I am the way, the truth, and the life" and "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die." This message of hope and salvation resonated deeply within their hearts, leading to their eventual baptisms.

Tulin and her husband relocated to Zahle, Lebanon, where they found a welcoming community in the Hope Evangelical Church. Tulin initially attended church meetings for worship, but about two years ago, she received a special invitation to participate in a missional leadership program.

This program proved to be transformative, as it was here that Tulin and her husband received teachings from dedicated brothers and sisters in Christ. Their instruction had a profound and positive impact on their lives, nurturing a deeper love for the Lord and a richer understanding of the Bible. Tulin's experience in the missional leadership program equipped her with the skills and knowledge necessary to become a leader and an influential force for good. She now can lead others to Christ, exemplifying the teachings of Jesus in her own life and sharing his love with those she encounters.

Her gratitude for the training and support she received at her new spiritual home reflects the impact that faith and a loving, supportive community can have in helping individuals grow, learn, and inspire others.

Sixty years is a long time! It’s significantly longer than any of the current Tyndale House Foundation staff members have been alive. It’s longer than the global average life expectancy was, as recently as 1950. It’s nearly three times the lifespan of the average business. For a nonprofit like THF to last sixty years is unusual and worth celebrating!

Sixty is also a number of biblical significance. In the New Testament church, sixty was considered the age at which a person had entered the final major phase of life. For example, in 1 Timothy 5, widows were not eligible for financial support until they were sixty years old. In the Old Testament, men who were sixty or older got a special discount on the required payment for making a vow to the Lord.

Sometimes sixty is used as a generic number meaning “a lot.” King Og of Bashan was said to control sixty cities (Josh. 13:30). King Nebuchadnezzar’s gold statue was sixty cubits high (Dan. 3:1). The number is even important in worship, as the ancient

Israelites sacrificed sixty rams and sixty lambs to dedicate the altar in the Tabernacle when it was completed (Num. 7:88). And Solomon’s Temple was sixty cubits long (1 Kings 6:2).

The point is that sixty is not only a big number but it’s a weighty number. It signifies largeness of size and advancement of age. It’s an important milestone.

Since its founding in 1963, Tyndale House Foundation has been dedicated to radical generosity, radical obedience, and radical impact. Our founders, Ken

and Margaret Taylor, were so committed to obedience and generosity that they gave the first dollars that came from their business success. They didn’t wait until they were wealthy to start a foundation; they started giving the moment they had something to give. That legacy, that commitment, has guided THF through six decades of ministry.

Now we stand on the threshold of another sixty years. We don’t know what the future will bring, but our fervent hope is that if we remain committed to the legacy we’ve been given, our next sixty years will bring even more impact than our first sixty years. Ken Taylor always used to say that Tyndale House Publishers was God’s company, and Tyndale House Foundation has always been committed to doing God’s work. Now that we’ve reached age sixty as an organization—a lot of years by any measure—my prayer is that Tyndale is not in its final phase of life but will be used powerfully by God for many years to come. May we be faithful to our legacy. May we remain committed to radical obedience, generosity, and impact. And may we always be unwaveringly focused on the task to which the Lord has called us. To God alone be the glory.




